CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

TRACY PUCKERIDGE

Welcome to the 2023 annual report. Congratulations to all health and physical educators in NSW & ACT for their commendable efforts.

This year has presented various challenges, from addressing teacher shortages to adjusting to new syllabus releases. Despite these obstacles, your motivation and commitment to students is admirable. It is your dedication and hard work that ensure students consistently achieve optimal outcomes. Keep up the exceptional work!

The release of the Stage 6 HMS syllabus and first draft K-6 & 7-10 PDHPE syllabuses promises to bring a fresh perspectives and opportunities to our field.

Professional learning - building capacity

High quality professional learning is the cornerstone of ACHPER NSW. This year, we delivered 53 events to over 2,300 teachers. Some of our highlights included:

- New Health Movement Science (HMS) syllabus professional learning we commenced roll out of a comprehensive new HMS program to support teachers. The first events included HMS Familiarisation webinars, followed by Leading Year 11 HMS Faculty Planning workshops which were extremely popular. Anticipate more initiatives in 2024!
- **Co-design team** we assembled a team of 9 experienced, practising teachers to work with our staff to help create and deliver the new HMS syllabus professional learning. Our dedication and financial commitment towards this initiative has ensured the program is high quality and relevant.
- **ACT professional learning** we used a hybrid face-to-face and online approach to deliver Australian curriculum professional learning to 70 teachers in the ACT.



• **K-12 PDHPE Conference** – was held at Western Sydney University in November and attended by 308 delegates. There was an incredible atmosphere across the two days, with more than 70 presenters sharing their knowledge and wisdom. The conference has become an annual highlight, consistently earning high satisfaction rates from delegates.

Community and resources

Our Early Career Teacher Conference was held in Sydney in May 2023. Feedback continues to be very positive with a 100% satisfaction rate for the second year in a row. We also established an Early Career Teachers Sub-committee comprising HALT accredited teachers, early career teachers, academics, and students. The sub-committee is dedicated to creating a supportive and nurturing environment for new PDHPE teachers.

In-school consultancy has increased over the past year demonstrating a growing recognition of value that ACHPER NSW can bring to educational settings. Collaborating with organisations like the AFL NSW & ACT and National Centre for Implementation Science indicates a growing recognition of the importance of practical implementation and the application of research in the educational setting. This consultancy work not only provides valuable insights and expertise but also fosters a collaborative environment where best practices can be shared and applied.

Our PDHPE Awards continue to be popular in recognising the innovative and highquality contributions teachers are making to health and physical education learning experience and outcomes for students.

Advocacy

ACHPER NSW continues to advocate with NESA, Department of Education, and the Minister for Education to support health and physical educators. We provided detailed input to the draft K-6 & 7-10 PDHPE syllabus released in July. We held information and consultation sessions on the drafts with over 200 PDHPE teachers. Our feedback was provided to NESA via a specific consultation meeting and our final submission to the NESA consultation, available on our website.



NEW HEALTH MOVEMENT SCIENCE SYLLABUS

The much-anticipated Health Movement Science (HMS) syllabus was released in July 2023. It signalled the start of an exciting time in PDHPE. The syllabus content is future-focused and has been reduced, allowing teachers and students time to delve deeper into content of interest and relevance.

To support teachers, ACHPER NSW developed and commenced roll out of a brand new program of professional learning. It focuses on customisable resources - translating the new syllabus into teacher-friendly sample program frameworks that can be personalised student cohort needs.

Importantly, the program drew on the experience and knowledge of highly experienced teachers. It was codesigned by ACHPER NSW staff and a team of practising PDHPE teachers.

The initial HMS professional learning program included:

- Assessing Year 11 HMS workshop (roll out 2024).

More professional learning will be developed and offered across 2024 and 2025 as teachers move towards implementation.

NEW DRAFT K-6 AND 7-10 PDHPE SYLLABUSES

NESA released first drafts of the K-6 and 7-10 PDHPE syllabuses in July 2023.

ACHPER NSW prepared a draft submission to the NESA consultation. ACHPER NSW staff also met with NESA representatives to discuss the drafts and provide feedback, which both highlighted strengths of the drafts and key concerns.

Via our social media and newsletters, we also strongly encouraged teachers to 'have their say' by making an individual submission to the consultation.

ACHPER NSW' submission and feedback combined input from our staff, stakeholders, and teachers.

Teacher views were sought at two Information Sessions we held in August 2023. Close to 90 teachers attended to both hear about the key changes and put forward their thoughts.







2023 K-12 PDHPE CONFERENCE

Over 300 PDHPE teachers and professionals attended the annual ACHPER NSW K-12 PDHPE conference at Western Sydney University in November.

"It's always great to bring together so many people from the PDHPE community," said Tracy Puckeridge, CEO of ACHPER NSW. "There was a genuine buzz among the hundreds of enthusiastic delegates, presenters, exhibitors, sponsors, volunteers and the ACHPER NSW team – all of whom contributed to a great two days.

Over 60 workshops were delivered across the two days by experienced teachers and leading health experts.

On day one Jenny Walsh delivered the keynote which explored the latest research on gender based violence and highlighted the growing issue of sexual violence being experienced by young people. She explained how social norms around gender is driving much of the sexual violence experienced by young people. Jenny outlined how an ethical framework

driving learning, rather than just focusing on what is legal, has a greater impact on decisions and behaviours.

The Stage 6 HMS stream was extremely popular with 125 teachers attending the sessions. Workshops included unpacking HMS content, scope and sequence, depth studies, collaborative investigations and how the six skills can be embedded in programs. A big hit were the practical sessions on body systems and Sustainable Development Goals.

Day one ended with a collaborative future planning session, where teachers divided into groups for HMS, CAFS and K-10.

"Teachers discussed opportunities to network and work together locally to program the new HMS syllabus and the K-10 PDHPE syllabuses that will be released in 2024," said Janice.

"The message from everyone was clear – teachers will need to collaborate across schools to share ideas, resources and the workload," said Janice.

Lindsay's work in health and physical education has resulted in improved student engagement, assessment rigour, and staff knowledge. She positively impacts students and staff through authentic learning experiences, community connection, and a successful sporting program.

Lindsay has played a key role in developing outstanding teaching and learning programs, accompanied by effective assessments. She meticulously develops programming protocols for each unit and lesson, along with teacher resources. Through practical protocols, aligned with physical literacy and incorporating peer feedback, Lindsay has achieved higher student engagement and a deeper

understanding of their learning journey. She proactively collects survey data from students ensuring a broader perspective when designing programs and assessments.

Through consistent engagement with stakeholders, she has elevated the rigor of assessments, resulting in a 31.6% increase in on-time submissions by Year 10 students within 12 months.

Lindsay has created all Stage 6 PDHPE resources and lifted the complexity of feedback provided to Stage 6 students resulting in a 17% increase in total average scores for the current cohort. As the leading developer of the school's transition to the Canvas platform she has developed detailed blueprints for PDHPE and school-wide teachers to follow.

Lindsay has made significant contributions to the Premier Sporting Challenge, lunchtime activities, and weekly sports. A combination of diverse activities and regular reflection on physical activity has enhanced student participation. Lindsay has also established a school fitness lab, a state-of-the-art facility providing students with invaluable opportunities to analyse movement and performance improvement.

The team's efforts have seen an increase in students trying out for sport teams, taking up whole school activities and year sports, as well as participation rates continually increasing in PE lessons. The PDHPE faculty continually improve culture and promote PDHPE as an essential part of education and school community wellbeing.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements cover Australian Council for Health, Physical Education and Recreation NSW Branch Incorporated as an individual entity. Australian Council for Health, Physical Education and Recreation NSW Branch Incorporated is a not-for-profit charity under the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulation 2013.* ('the Regulations').

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

Basis of Preparation

In the opinion of the Committee of Management, the charity is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Regulations.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of:

- AASB 101, Presentation of Financial Statements
- · AASB 107, Statement of Cash Flows
- AASB 108, Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors
- AASB 1054, Australian Additional Disclosures.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the charity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

At the end of each reporting period the charity determines whether there is evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where this indicator exists and regardless for goodwill, indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the assets is estimated.

Where assets do not operate independently of other assets, the recoverable amount of the relevant cash-generating unit (CGU) is estimated.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of the fair value less costs of disposal and the value in use. Value in use is the present value of the future cash flows expected to be derived from an asset or cash-generating unit.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Reversal indicators are considered in subsequent periods for all assets which have suffered an impairment loss, except for goodwill.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Interest revenue

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

Dividend revenue

Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depends on whether the outcome of the services can be measured reliably. If this is the case then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period. If the outcome cannot be reliably measured then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

Income Tax

The charity is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.


